

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## ASK GUS



I'm going to offer you a few specific suggestions on skin care. The most important thing to remember is not every product or procedure will work with everyone. I mentioned in my last article about caring for your feet. You may want to consult with a Podiatrist about a custom pair of shoes. Another option in a pair of diabetic or orthopedic shoes to ensure proper protection. They may cost a little more but in the long run they will be well worth it.

If you use armrests, you have to protect your elbows. Your therapist can advise you on this option. Do you wear a leg bag? If so, find straps that hold your bag in place that don't irritate or break down your skin. Again there are many options. Also, when the bag is half full, empty it! If you let it get full to the bursting point, urine can back up into your bladder and kidneys and you're looking at a whole host of new problems. A full bag will also cause the straps to put additional pressure on your leg which in turn can cause pressure sores. Skin ulcers on areas below your level of injury, especially on your legs, can be very difficult to heal and take a long time to do so. Avoid this situation! Common sense and asking questions will go a long way in making life with a spinal cord injury much easier to live with.



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## UPDATES FROM SCOTT GRIFFITH

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### 2019 COLA Increase



The 2019 Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) is set for a 2.8% increase based on the final CPI calculations for 3rd quarter inflation measurement period. This is the largest COLA increase since 2011 when it was 3.6%. Last year's increase was 2%. COLA Increases are based on the inflation measurement period of the 3rd quarter (July, August, and September) compared to the previous 3rd quarter.



“The 2.8 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits payable to more than 62 million Social Security beneficiaries in January 2019. Increased payments to more than 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December 31, 2018.” SSA Statement.

### 2019 Cola Effective & Payment Dates:



Retired military veterans, VA rates for compensation and pension for disabled veterans and surviving families will be effective December 1, 2018 and will be reflected on the first check to be paid on December 31, 2018.

Social Security benefits will be effective beginning with the December 2018 benefits, which are payable in January 2019.

Federal SSI & SSDI payment levels will be effective for payments made for January 2019.



# Presidents Report


I am very honored to have been elected to serve as President of our Wisconsin Chapter. I stand committed to upholding our mission and to continuing to keep the Chapter financially sound.

Our work is carried out through a number of programs that focus on research and education, quality healthcare, access to benefits, advocacy and legislation, membership and outreach, and adaptive sports and recreation.

# Our Year In Review

The Paralyzed Veterans of America – Wisconsin Chapter is a multifaceted organization. We work hard to develop programs and activities that have a meaningful impact on the lives of our members and on the communities in which they live. Each of these program areas is critical to helping us fulfill our mission. Here is a summary of what 2017-18 was about.

## Advocacy & Legislation



This program is the very core of why the Wisconsin Chapter exists. It is often the behind the scenes program that works to ensure our Veterans and others with disabilities are able to live their lives free of barriers.

Our annual trip to Washington focused on the issues of Equal Access to Transportation, Educational Opportunities, Job Training and Accessible Housing. We used the information gathered to inform and educate all ten (10) of our Senators and Representatives to ensure they are aware of this important legislation and requested their votes.

Locally, we are here to support every member through challenges they experience. Whether it's van accessible parking at the post office or automatic doors to areas in a medical facility, we are here to be your voice. Let us know how we can help.

There is always work to be done and the more voices we have the more powerful and affective we can be. Consider being part of this committee.

## Healthcare & Benefits

This program is designed to assist members in applying for and obtaining benefits. Mr. Robert Perkins is our National Service Officer. Linda Roberts supports Robert and fields most of the calls and questions when you contact the benefits office.

Our Hospital Liaison program allows us to have a presence at the Spinal Cord Injury Unit (SCI) to ensure that any issues our members have, with care, can be addressed. We encourage you to seek out your liaison to learn more about our programs and share your perspectives.



## Adaptive Sports & Recreation



It has been a busy year for our Adaptive Sports and Recreation Program. Once again we have supported a Wheel Chair Lacrosse team and a fishing tournament in Port Washington. Our reimbursement program sent 10 Veterans to the 38th Annual National Veterans Wheel Chair Games where the Gold Medals were plenty! Members also traveled to the Winter Sports Clinic participating in some great ski training and other adaptive winter adventures.

As always, we offered a robust shooting program. Our air rifle program is gaining traction and we are seeing a consistent number of shooters each month. The summer saw a slate of trap shooting events. In addition to the trap circuit, the Chapter furthered its partnership with Veterans Afield. Shoots included both trap and birds from stands and in the field on a specially designed trailer. We are very proud that both of these programs include Youth Shoots that give young people the opportunity to interact with and learn from disabled veterans.

## Membership & Communication

This year many of our communication tools have undergone significant upgrades and our outreach efforts into the community have expanded considerably and become much more effective.

Our newsletter and website continue to reach many people, and we are more active than ever on Facebook and twitter and even have an Instagram account. This has allowed us to reach members in new ways, but has also allowed us to educate the general public about who we are and what we do. Be sure to check it out!

Our outreach has grown to include a lunch program and grab n go bags for all individuals having their annual exam at the SCI. We have been serving dinner once a month at the Fischer House too, supporting the caregivers of our members. We participated in the Veteran's Day parade in Milwaukee and more!



## Research & Education

This program supports and promotes research related to spinal cord injury and disease as well as educating those who choose to dedicate their careers to individuals faced with these issues.

Your chapter has fulfilled this program by providing funding for National Research and Education Foundations. Locally, we offer individuals employed at the SCI scholarships to continue their education.



# Who We Serve

PVA and its 32 individual chapters are Member driven organizations. A qualifying Veteran may join any local chapter. As such, you will see in the map below that our Wisconsin Chapter actually has members across the country.

Being in the hospital is not fun, but is a regular way of life for many of our members. To make their time a little more enjoyable, our Chapter will provide items they can borrow during their stay like cell phone chargers, earbuds/headphones, and other items that they may need during their stay.

## **Caregiver Lunch and Learn**



## **Home Safety**


